A Garden for the senses Accessibility for all is goal of two-phase Sensory Garden

Fall membership picnic includes kickoff for \$300,000 fund-raising campaign

Friends of the Garden members, now more than 800 strong, are invited to a hot dog and all-the-fixins' picnic, from 11:30 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 16, during the weekend celebration of the first-year anniversary of the Springfield-Greene County Botanical Center. Guests can join us when they buy a \$25 Friends of the Garden membership.

When Dr. Bill Roston designed the Sensory Garden at Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park eight years ago, he dreamed of a setting to accommodate those with physical, visual and hearing disabilities so they could experience the five senses of sight, smell, sound, taste and touch. Now that dream is about to become real.


"We live in an age of anti-depressants. Our lifestyle creates stress and anxiety," says Dr. Roston. "Gardens are therapeutic, that is, therapy without pills. Our Sensory Garden will put the tranquility gears in your brain to work."

An osteopath for 43 years, Roston envisioned raised beds with braille labeling, wide paths and shady nooks - accessible to all.

Nancy Hopkins heads a fundraising committee to raise the nearly \$300,000 needed to construct Phase 1 of the Sensory Garden.

"I feel strongly about how this barrier-free green space will soothe, stimulate and comfort all those who visit this plant-rich accessible environment," said Hopkins, a retired educator. "Not only through the senses, but also through the sixth sense - the reflectiveness and nostalgia that comes from engaging with

our natural habitat." A vine- and ivy-covered pergola anchors the Sensory Garden's center and provides an area to grow vining plants that will attract butterflies and hummingbirds.



What the Sensory Garden will include:

- A dozen separate raised garden beds, all wheelchair height.
- Wide-paved paths to allow two wheelchairs to pass easily.
- Braille-labeled plants and flowers.
- Fruit-bearing trees and shrubs.
- Babbling brook, waterfall and koi pond.
- Moss flower bed garden.
- Hummingbird feeders, wind chimes and rustling grasses.
- Shady nooks with comfortable seating and scenic views.
- Hanging baskets, vertical wall gardens.
- Outdoor classroom for demonstrations and hands-on activities.
- Phase 2: greenhouse, pavilion, restrooms and sound room.

The fundraising campaign will officially kick off at the Friends of the Garden membership picnic during the oneyear anniversary festivities at the Springfield-Greene County Botanical Center.

There are those who shout about their contributions and seek headlines. Susan Boswell – volunteer, gardener, artist, interior designer, painter, compassionate human being – is not one of those people.

She's a "blessing to the community," says her neighbor Nancy Hopkins. "Whatever she is passionate about, she throws her whole heart and soul into it."

She doesn't advertise her giving or seek the spotlight. She just gives – of both funds and her time. Susan became a member of the FOG board of directors six years ago and is completing her second three-year term.

Almost a year ago, Susan prevailed on Jeanne Duffey to follow her as chair of the Friends of the Garden Development Committee. "She was instrumental in helping raise millions of dollars (along with \$400,000 from Greene County and \$3 million approved by voters in 2006) to help build the Springfield-Greene County Botanical Center, and then, as icing on the cake, donated funds and designed a horticulture library housed inside the center in memory of her mother.

The name on the new library at the Botanical Center reads, "Lois K. Boswell Memorial Library," in honor of Susan s mother, but it is also a tribute to an entire family's way of giving back.

I was at the Redbud Garden recently when an older gentleman leaving the gazebo asked, "Who takes care of this beautiful garden?"

I explained that Friends of the Garden along with a number of other community organizations or Park Partners work hard to build and maintain most of the gardens in Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park. (See a complete list of more than 25 Park Partners at www.friendsofthegarden.org.)

We have a special working relationship with the Springfield-Greene County Parks Department. Members of the dedicated hard-working parks staff help with the "heavy lifting," mowing, delivering mulch, tree trimming and the general operation of heavy or power equipment for a number of park projects. This is in addition to the parks department employees staffing the Botanical Center building. Some 250 volunteers do most of the rest

of the work needed to keep the majority of the gardens looking their best while assisting in and around the Botanical Center. Volunteers designed,

constructed and maintain gardens and other assets such as the Bill Roston Native Butterfly House. The volunteers do what they do for the community. Their reward is to see people respond when they visit and hear the comments on how much they enjoy what Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park has to offer. Especially the educational benefits from the garden's plant material, the Butterfly House,

Board will be nominated at September meeting

The **FOG Nominating Committee** chaired by **Marthe Close** will deliver its report on nominations for the board of directors at the membership meeting on Sept. 8. Voting will follow at the Oct. 6 meeting, and terms will begin immediately.

This year we have had community businesses and area groups that assisted with work days including Expedia, Kraft, Ozarks Regional Young Marines, Good Samaritan Boys Ranch and Kids Across America. My answer is, we understand, for example just your membership in Friends of the Garden enables us to purchase plant material, irrigation systems, etc., while funding general operations including some contract labor if there are not enough volunteers. Laser engraving machine will help identify plants for visitors

As the gardens become a favorite destination throughout the Ozarks and beyond, FOG and Master Gardeners of Greene County have teamed up with the Springfield/Greene County Botanical Center to address one of our most challenging

chores: Keeping the thousands of plants properly labeled so they can serve as a resource they were intended to be. By splitting the purchase of a \$12,800 laser engraver

between the two groups, we all benefit. The Botanical Center will cover the cost of materials, and labeling can begin. This investment is expected to save

thousands spent outsourcing signage, and has the potential for bringing revenue to the organizations.

For those of you who like to know what's under the hood, we're talking about the VLS3.50 Laser Engraving and Cutting System with 24 x 12 inch engraving/cutting field, 30-watt laser cartridge, air assist, standard 2.0" focal length lens, motorized automatic Z-axis adjustment, X-Y beam positioning system, self-adjusting spring loaded sealed bearings, stationary processing table, shielded optical components, interchangeable focusing optics, flash upgradeable electronics, unlimited job file storage and on-screen file preview, job complete indicator, system status indicator, re-locatable origin, enhanced vector cutting and rubber stamp mode.

We've expressed the notion that the gardens are a kind of library of plants. Soon you will be able to identify plants by popular and Latin name whenever possible, and select your own garden cultivars while you enjoy a walk in the park. Special thanks to **Hannah Renner**, who not only maintains the Ornamental Grass Garden, but has taken on the challenge of identifying the various cultivars for labeling.

At **Friends the Garden.org**, you'll find an entire virtual community and garden resources that should satisfy your inquisitive side. And, of course, we're on **Facebook** by the same name.

Festival attracts 4,000 to gardens

An estimated 4,000 visitors attended the third annual Friends of the Garden Butterfly Festival and Bluegrass Concert on July 16 and 17. Federated Garden Clubs Gray/Campbell Farmstea GREENE Magazine/Geo Christie Heaton

All told, at least 10,000 have so far toured the Butterfly House so far this season, in spite of a month of insatiable heat (including the festival weekend).

Cindy Willis, chair of the festival, issued a special word of thanks to the 26 vendors and more than 100 volunteers who spent much of their weekend Saturday and Sunday welcoming visitors. Revenue from donations to defray the cost of the event grew from \$600 last year to \$1,700 this year.

Flautist returning to gardens for concert

Bettine Clemen

Bettine Clemen, a flautist who has appeared in more than 85 countries, will perform at 2 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 16, at the Botanical Center. Admission to the concert is \$25 per person. Tickets are available in advance at the Botanical Center gift

shop, beginning on Sept. 1, from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m., Monday-Saturday, and from 11 a.m. until 6 p.m. Sunday. Tickets will be available at the door, but seating is limited to 120.

This fundraiser, which benefits Friends of the Garden, "expresses the interconnectedness of all life and how music as the universal language can bring us all closer together - humans, animals, plants, trees and all life forms into harmony," says Clemen.

"We are grateful to Bettine for offering to do this concert," says Nancy Hopkins, who chairs the committee to raise funds to build the Sensory Garden at Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park. "Her concerts are multi-sensory, just as the Sensory Garden will be, a tranquil, accessible place for everyone, but especially for those with physical, visual and hearing

disabilities."

Clemen combines light classical, pop, jazz and ethnic music. She has performed in the U.S., Jordan, China, Japan, South America, South Africa, Sri Lanka and Russia.

"Be prepared," she says, "to meet at least 80 elephants, thousands of penguins, a very ancient turtle, many camels and other exotic animals," serenaded on seven different flutes.

A native of Bavaria, Clemen has played more than 300 concerts in the U.S., recording a dozen CDs and DVDs and writing a book,

"Open Your Ears to Love." She has aso performed and taught in Shanghai and Beijing. Her film, "Flutasia: A Love Song for a Planet, was shown twice on PBS stations in the Midwest. Clemen lived in the Ozarks south of Seymour



Take the right turn to get to the gardens

Visitors to Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park and Arboretum describe the experience as an unexpected adventure. But of course you've got to get there to enjoy it, and that can be a bit challenging. This map, which includes directions to the parks (inset map) as well directions for convenient parking, will help. If you are new to the gardens, you can locate each garden numerically at right. Those with an asterisk* are planned but not yet under construction. A "Guide By Cell" tour of the garden parks is now available by calling 417-213-3016. After a brief introduction, callers may dial a garden code on each sign followed by the # key (For example, 34# is the White Garden) for information on various gardens. Introductions for every garden and the Butterfly House (46#) have been recorded, with signage in place listing the numbers for each garden.
