Garden plans taking shape Three gardens merge into one;

plan now includes outdoor kitchen

For Friends of the Garden, raising funds to maintain and expand the gardens is a top priority. One garden has a unique purpose: the Sensory Garden.

If you've ever wondered just who a sensory garden might serve, meet Megan Shermer, a recent visitor to the gardens just before the holidays.

When she was born in Kunming City in the Yunnan Province of China a decade ago, Megan could see. By the time she was three years old, she had lapsed into blindness caused by advanced glaucoma and was living in an orphanage. She desperately needed surgery, but that was unlikely.

When she was six years old, Megan's new parents brought her half way around the world to the Ozarks. Today, she is 10 years old, enrolled at Ozark North Elementary School, and very much a part of a family that includes her brothers, Jackson, 15, and Evan, 13; sister, Sutton, 8, and parents, Rob and Aundrayah Shermer of Ozark.

"We don't even use the word adoption," says her mother, Aundrayah Shermer, who was the first child in Missouri approved for adoption by blind parents in 1970. Raised within sight of the Gateway Arch, she has a younger blind sister born five years later.

Aundrayah has normal sight, but her profession at Missouri State University includes assisting blind and visually impaired students on campus. Husband Rob is a former videographer who now works as a substance abuse counselor.

Megan recently visited the Close Memorial Gardens to enjoy a slice of life most of us take for granted. Even so, she must take extra caution. Gardens are not suited for visually impaired visitors, let alone those in wheel chairs. The Sensory Garden will emphasize all the senses, including the taste of plants in the "Edible Garden/ Outdoor Kitchen."

Combining these gardens follows a three-hour session led by national landscape design Tres Fromme, a second-time visitor to The Botanical Center. So far, the campaign has raised \$10,000 in donations, including \$3,500 from a concert featuring flautist Bettine Clemen. Clemen has agreed to another concert on behalf of FOG on gardening and the going-green movement." Aug. 25.



Dogwood Grove one of many ways to remember

There comes a time when you know it's springtime by the abundance of native dogwoods in the Ozarks, whose delicate blossoms seem to float in the distance in both native and urban settings.

"I thought there were two kinds of dogwoods, white and pink," says retired city manager Tom Finnie, a Master Gardener with with his wife, Kay. When she died on June 5, 2010, her family requested that donations be made to the Kay C. and Thomas W. Finnie Fund at the Community Foundation of the Ozarks or the Springfield Symphony Association, which Kay served as president.

Now those funds have been directed to develop a grove of dogwood trees just east of the Botanical Center, one of the first sights visitors see when they scan the original Nathanael Greene Park. Funds will also be used to maintain the grove of dogwoods in perpetuity.

Tom considers the dogwood tree one of Kay's favorites, and a fitting tribute to her memory. But he and others are hoping for something more, that others may follow suit along with so many others by their own donations to specific projects. The Dwarf Conifer Garden, for example, was made possible by a gift from the family of Jack and Ann Gentry, and now includes a fountain created from native rock.

Many of the features, from memorial bricks in three locations to native Phenix Marble benches are memorials to friends

"The development of the dogwood garden will occur over a decade. Dogwoods that can tolerate more sun include the twig, cornelian cherry and Asian Kousa dogwoods that look very similar to our native flowering dogwood. As the shade trees develop, more of the flowering and ground cover dogwoods will be added to the collection. This will truly be a beautiful garden every day of the year and a wonderful sanctuary for people and wildlife."

Final Report:

An epic year for the Gardens

It's hard to believe that my third year as president of Friends of the Garden is over. As you know, a lot of great things have developed around the Botanical Center & Gardens this past year with the help of our many volunteers and all of our members.

The Azalea Garden is in place with the exception of some stone work and the foot bridge; it was adopted by Kim Hutter. The Winter Garden phase one is complete with phase two already underway. The concept was introduced by Bill Roston with the working design by Gail Wright.

Bill Roston is currently designing and working on a water feature for the garden.

A major donor agreed to fund construction and maintenance of the Kay Cummins Finnie Memorial Dogwood Garden. A first-class design by Katie Steinhoff is in place and work on the garden has already begun. The Ethnic Tree Trail Memorial, including 32 black gum trees, donated by Jim Mauldin and his group is almost complete.

A paved sandstone area with arbor were installed for weddings and other events in the Dwarf Conifer Garden. The gardens all have an official "adopter," including Avis Holloway who joined the Dwarf Conifer Garden crew of Ed and Ruby Miller.

All of the Close Memorial Park gardens we wanted on automatic irrigation (because of potential problems with disease, the Rose Garden isn't included) are now on line with the completion of the Redbud Garden during November.

Merger of the Sensory Garden with the proposed Parks Department Kitchen Garden is a work in progress. The Entrance Garden has been redesigned by Katie Steinhoff to expand it. Construction should be ready to start in 2012 with funding assistance from another private donor.

In Close Memorial Park we had three major "Garden Extreme Makeovers" in 2012. The Ornamental Grass Garden by Hannah Renner with her volunteers and the Hosta Garden organized by Tom Lakowske along with the Greater Ozarks Hosta Society. The Redbud Garden was brought to life by Stan Horsch working with a dedicated crew.

The Ozark Daylily Society members and Ozarks Regional Lily Society with Frank Mason worked hard on their respective gardens to improve their presentation to the public, these gardens should be a stand out this coming year. A major donation of plant material was provided the garden and the Missouri Native Plant Society planted it in an area developed by Friends of the Garden volunteers just south of the Wildflower Garden.

Three additional major improvements were made to the support structure of the gardens. A major donor funded an 810 foot section of blacktop trail along the east side of Close Memorial Park connecting the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll garden and the Gray-Campbell Farmstead to the South Creek Greenway. The trail base was graded with rock provided by the Parks Department. Electrical service was brought to the south side of Lake Drummond to serve the Dwarf Conifer Garden thanks to the efforts of Friends of the Garden members Ed Miller and Bob Childress working with the Parks Department. Finally Friends of the Garden and the Parks Department worked together to extended 4 inch water lines east and south of the new Botanical Center to help with the gardens complex irrigation system.

The Bill Roston Native Butterfly House had record attendance that exceeded 17,000 during 2011 keeping Scott Cunningham and his

group of volunteer docents busy from mid May through September. The very successful Butterfly Festival repeated again last July, thanks to Cindy Wills and her group of over 100 volunteers. The end of September Lisa Bakerink with her group of volunteers held our second successful Monarch Watch Butterfly Tagging day. The Butterfly House Operations Group is planning to start a Junior Docent training program this coming spring centered around 5th graders with an adult partner.

During the year we participated in many community events from the Lawn & Garden Show, to Young Spouts, the Japanese Fall Festival, and the Botanical Center anniversary to name a few. Along the way we sponsored the 2011 January Bee Keeping Class, Tablescapes, the Easter Egg Roll, and Santa & Friends.

The merger of the Botanical Society of Southwest Missouri and FOG was officially completed the end of October. The new Japanese Gardening Group is at work to identify, prioritize, and plan the funding needed for maintenance projects throughout the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden. The 7.5 acre garden has been adopted by Don and Nancy Schmidt working in conjunction with the Parks Department and other volunteers.



Those with an asterisk* are planned but not yet under construction. A "Guide By Cell" tour of the garden parks is now available by calling 417-213-3016.
