

Evenings of Romance at Japanese Garden

For those among us who are romantically inclined, and of a certain age, the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden Committee has created four special evenings to enjoy the gardens in a new way for many of us – at night.

On two weekends, Friday and Saturday, Oct. 17 and 18, and again Nov. 7 and 8 (beneath a nearly full fall moon on Nov. 6), the public is invited to experience the serenity of the gardens illuminated as only tiki torches and paper lanterns. Hours are 7:30-10 p.m. each evening for guests only since the gardens close in early October. Admission is \$5 per person, and guests must be at least 17 years of age.

As part of the fund-raiser to support the stroll gardens, floating wishing

lanterns (actually LEDs) will be available for \$5 each to be launched on one of the three ponds. Light music and a romantic stroll will add to the evening. Seven new Koi have recently been donated to the gardens by Christie Thorpe, including two "Dragon Carp."

"We are in the final push to ready the Japanese Stroll Garden for its' 30th anniversary celebration in 2015," says Nancy Schmidt, co-chair of the event.

"The past winter caused both the volunteers and the parks personnel significant delays on several projects plus the garden took a real beating," adds Cochair Don Schmidt. "We lost a lot of trees and some shrubs. In the Meditation Garden alone, eight maple trees need to

be replaced. We also lost most of the azaleas. "

Also on display will be eight new granite lanterns, along with a new granite basin for the Tea House.

A beautiful new wooden fence has be installed along the west side of the garden. The second project was a major landscaping project at the Stone Bridge. Parks craftsmen Mike Mills and Jason Shaw built the stone bridge in frigid winter weather conditions, and then landscaped the area. With the help of Parks staff, the Stroll Garden Committee upgraded the display windows at the pavilion outside the garden and also improved the display lighting with new LEDs.

To simply say that Kevin Firth is a volunteer lepidopterist who has been a major influence on others in countless projects only begins to describe his involvement in Friends of the Garden.

He and daughter Lindsay are both excellent docents who truly educate visitors. A butterfly and insect enthusiast herself, she is featured in literature promoting the **Missouri Prairie Foundation**.

As a member of the Springfield Plateau Chapter of the Missouri Master Naturalists, Kevin volunteers in a variety of ways. Professionally, he handles echocardiograms as a Mercy ECHO technologist. But he does some a heavy lifting in the Bill Roston Native Butterfly House, from helping lay the brick floor to pruning.

"He was a major contributor in working to lay the brick pavers inside the Butterfly House last summer," says Dr. Chris Barnhart, curator of the house. "After hours, he is a constant source of information about the natural history of our favorite insects, an excellent and perceptive photographer, and the go-to guy for identification of specimens. He's been essential to all of the work projects, from brick work to pruning, to raising livestock."

"One of the most amazing things about Kevin is that he can identify just about any caterpillar, moth, and butterfly, but not just by it's common name, by its scientific name," says Lisa

Indeed, this may be your first newsletter. So, if you're new, welcome aboard, and we hope you will join us for our annual Membership Appreciation event on Sunday, Oct. 5 on the plaza. Although we receive assistance from the incredible parks staff, volunteers have done many of the garden chores, maintaining existing gardens, planning and creating new ones as funds allow. Even this newsletter, our daily blog, the FOG calendar, news releases to

the media and the special mailings and messaging we do throughout the year are all the work of volunteers. You will also find us online at **FriendsoftheGarden.org**, on Facebook and Twitter.

If you're new, or perhaps enjoying new circumstances such as retirement, we need your help. I got involved through the Bill Roston Butterfly House and the butterfly festival. In addition to raising and tagging Monarchs, I became a master gardener, a board member, and then your president.

Only when I became a volunteer did I truly realize how many workers are needed to sustain what we do. This includes special events in the gardens and in the community. We also get help from the residents of the Good Samaritan Boys Ranch, Kids Across America and various college groups. Masters Gardeners, under the auspices of the MU Extension Service, maintain the Demonstration Garden and Xeriscape Garden, staff the Master Gardeners Hotline Monday-Friday, 9 a.m. -4:30 p.m. and Saturday 9 a.m. - Noon, from March through October. Many of us are active in both groups. In 2015, there will be more to celebrate, including Friends of the Gardens' 15th year, our fifth year in the botanical center, and the 30th year of the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden. Planning is already underway for a garden symposium in the fall of 2015.

Who is buried in Nathanael Greene's tomb and other queries

The Botanical Center staff, University of Missouri Greene County Extension office staff and the Master Gardeners Hotline volunteers receive the most ponderous questions from visitors of all ages. With so many names, featured attractions and partners involved in making 2400 S. Scenic Avenue such a vibrant attraction, it is no wonder that there has been some confusion and many questions about the 'how

to find,' and 'what to see' here.



A Parks Perspective **Katie Steinhoff**

While the Springfield-Greene County Botanical Center is the cauldron of all the sparks of activity generated within this 114-acre garden park, the true attractions are the outdoor gardens.

In developing a 'brand' or better descriptive name, Springfield Botanical Gardens at Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park is what we believe will help new visitors find us, but honors the historical names that people recognize with this park.

One of the biggest hurdles for getting people to the gardens relates to the name. If you don't know what you're looking for, it may be hard to find. If it were not such a problem, it is almost comical how many people end up at the Nathan Boone Home near Ash Grove

site looking for botanical gardens or end up here assuming that a Memorial Garden is a cemetery.

The intention of all the founders of these attractions fits the definition of a botanical garden. Botanical Gardens are much bigger than a library or collection of plants, but are critically important institutions for preserving endangered species, supporting the green industry and serving as living laboratories to teach how plants touch every aspect of our lives.

The gardens are used to interpret so many stories and teach so many lessons. The settlers of the Gray-Campbell Farmstead owed their survival to the plants they used to build shelter and for food. The native butterflies are dependent on specific host plants for their survival. Botanical Gardens also help paint the picture that helps us understand the culture as you find in our Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden.

Another hurdle for getting people around the gardens is that the starting point is really at the heart rather than the head of the garden. The Botanical Center that serves as a welcome, visitor and education center straddles the property boundary between Nathanael Greene and Close Memorial Park.

Frequently asked questions

• Can you have weddings in the park?

Yes, but you should make a reservation with the botanical center to make sure it is not in use by another group.

 Can a professional photographer take advantage of the beautiful gardens as backdrops?
 Yes, but they are required to carry a \$25/day permit

Yes, but they are required to carry a \$25/day permit or \$150/season permit at the gift shop. Park rangers enforce this rule. As garden ambassadors, you can advise professional photographers that permits are available in the gift shop.

• Is a photo pass the same as admission to the Japanese Stroll Garden?

No. The photo pass is essentially a permit to operate a private business on public lands. Photographers and clients would be subject to the admission fees.

• Are there any garden areas where you are not allowed to photograph or have a garden wedding or event?

No, the gardens are more open than ever, including the Japanese Stroll Garden, now available for weddings by reservation. Wedding ceremonies will be at the moon deck event lawn. The cost is \$500 for a four-hour time block. Photographers can use the tea house, bridges or garden scenes as a backdrops as long as they follow the rules in the photo policy. Photographers cannot disturb events or programs or block access to garden attractions.

We are now one year away from the fifth year anniversary of the opening of the Springfield-Greene County Botanical Center. We are embarking on a master landscape plan and branding effort so that by this time next year, we hope to have earned the reputation of being one of the three leading botanical institutions within the state of Missouri.

As we move into the next phase of the development of the gardens, the Sensory Garden plan includes a center piece garden in a round-a-bout fashion that will firmly direct new people to the Botanical Center and develop the infrastructure, like greenhouses we need to support display gardens yearround. Won't you help us continue to grow the gardens?

And about Gen. Nathanael Greene, for whom Greene County was named. He was one of the youngest generals in the Revolutionary War. To those who want to know where Nathanael Greene is, he is buried in Johnson Square in Savannah, Georgia.

Feedback:

MU Extension's growing value to Greene County residents

Why is MU Greene County Extension important to the Friends of the Garden, the Springfield Botanical Gardens and the residents of Greene County? It is the very "heart" of university research-based information available to residents of Greene County and beyond.

Many residents call or come by the Master Gardeners of Greene County Hotline in the botanical center hoping for answers to the many hundreds of questions that come up regarding horticulture. Other contacts with the Extension offices deal with 4-H, agriculture and other issues. The Extension Service office is where people who want a soil test or to have a plant analyzed for disease come to leave their samples.

MU Extension programs provide training on nutrition, parenting, entrepreneurship, personal finance, fire and rescue training and more. The botanical center meeting rooms are used to present many topics of interest to the public, all of which bring large number of visitors to the Springfield Botanical Gardens.

Once visitors are introduced to the Master Gardener Hotline service, meeting rooms, etc. at the Botanical Center, they often return to explore the 114 acres with its 36 gardens and other features.

All this activity leads to more potential members for organizations like Friends of the Garden, Master Gardeners of Greene County, Master Naturalists, Greater Ozarks Hosta Society, Friends of the Gray-Campbell Farmstead, Ozark Daylily Society, Federated Garden Clubs, other park partners and friends.

You can help us spread the message. Please join Friends of Greene County Extension as we work to provide needed financial support due to reduced funding from the Greene County budget process. Over the last few years, the MU Extension office's operating income has been reduced to the state-mandated minimum of \$10,000. This is not enough to sustain ongoing operations. 

Take the right turn to get to the gardens

Visitors to Springfield Botanical Gardens often describe the experience as an unexpected adventure. But of course you've got to get there to enjoy it. This aerial map will help you get around Nathanael Greene Park and the adjoining Close Memorial Gardens, located at 2400 S. Scenic. You can locate each garden numerically at right. Those with an asterisk* are planned but not yet under construction. A "Guide By Cell" tour of the garden parks is available by calling 417-213-3016. After a brief introduction, callers may dial a garden code on each sign followed by the # key (For example, 35# is the Hosta Garden) for information on various gardens. Introductions for every garden have been recorded, with signage in place listing the corresponding numbers to hear about each garden.
