

A wish list of goals for the gardens for the years to come

A Parks Perspective Katie Steinhoff

The Springfield Botanical Gardens have been the backdrop for many people's memorable experience and set the stage for their hopes and dreams of the future. Not only the weddings, baby showers, birthdays and anniversary events we host, but the community still has hopes and dreams for an authentic botanical institution for Southwest Missouri.

Some of our volunteers and financial supporters have very vivid and ambitious dreams, but before we lose our minds with lists of gifts we want for our park, I thought we should reflect

upon the 2014 season and I will share some thoughts about what we need for the next stage in the gardens' growth.

Gardens are theater, and like every good theater house, there is a back stage, or behind the scenes aspect to the experience. Currently, the backstage often resides in volunteers' car trunks, a corner of a couple offices, and some storage buildings around the park.

greenhouse and home for horticulture is plant host plants in the butterfly house. To expand the hours the needed for protecting tropicals, growing house is open, more volunteer plants large enough for displays and producing high end horticulture displays throughout the year. The production greenhouse would be just one of the facets of the Sensory Garden, which would allow us to expand our programming throughout the year.

While we do hope to start on phase 1 of the Sensory Garden this spring, we will still be somewhat limited in providing hands on horticulture experience every day without a greenhouse.

What a unique experience for an internship with the Dr. Roston Native Butterfly House! Imagine a living museum, a bug zoo with flowers and education for all ages rolled up into one. A college intern with an interest in entomology, horticulture, environmental education, or even recreation would have an unforgettable learning opportunity for their future career. With more than 26,000 visitors strictly on

limited hours offered by volunteers, imagine what a gift it would be for our citizens and visitors if we could keep the Butterfly House open daily. If someone could fund a stipend for 40 hours per week for even 10 weeks out of the year, it would cost \$3,200-4,000 per season.

Nature has approved our park and the blue bird houses have been well-loved and worn... The Greater Ozarks Audubon Society needs replacement blue bird boxes with predator guards and easy cleaning access that doesn't require a

We were extremely fortunate to finally see Liberty School added to the Gray-Campbell Farmstead attraction to the botanical gardens in 2014. Volunteer Herb Batson has begun to plant some black berries and would like to plant an heirloom variety orchard with apples, pears and grapes to enhance the interpretation of our ancestors' close connection with the land and plants.

The Public Works Lake Drummond Spillway enhancement has definitely reduced the flooding problems under Scenic Ave along the South Creek Greenway Trail. Clearing out invasive

Take the right turn to get to the gardens

Visitors to Springfield Botanical Gardens often describe the experience as an unexpected adventure. But of course you've got to get there to enjoy it. This aerial map will help you get around Nathanael Greene Park and the adjoining Close Memorial Gardens, located at 2400 S. Scenic. You can locate each garden numerically at right. Those with an asterisk* are planned but not yet under construction. A "Guide By Cell" tour of the garden parks is available by calling 417-213-3016. After a brief introduction, callers may dial a garden code on each sign followed by the # key (For example, 35# is the Hosta Garden) for information on various gardens.
