
Busy season begins: Will you step up and be a volunteer?

Along the north edge of the Springfield Botanical Gardens, 39 thriving native black gum trees (Nyssa sylvatica) line the narrow road that leads from the park entrance to the Japanese Stroll Garden and Gray-Campbell Farmstead.

Most of us may drive by this tree line without a second thought - at least so far.

The "Ethnic Life Stories Trail of Trees" is a celebration of the cultural diversity of the Ozarks and Springfield. Each tree is a memorial to a person, a family and a culture.

Stones identify the honorees, and a single larger stone explains their significance. Each of the 39 persons represented in the Ethnic Life Stories Project has a written history, on file in the Botanical Center library for anyone to enjoy. They are also available online through the Springfield/Greene County Library.

As with any endeavor, no one person could have achieved this project alone. But Jim Mauldin, now a spry 94, made it happen, thanks to a dream he had



years ago to honor the wide variety of ethnic groups and cultures that thrive in the Ozarks.

Docents needed to expand hours in Roston Butterfly House in 2015

One of the goals for our organization in 2015 is to expand the hours at the Roston Native Butterfly House. For good reason: the number of visitors in 2014 topped 25,000, and the number of organizations requesting a group tour is growing.

All this is dependent on our ability to recruit and train volunteer docents. Two training dates are upcoming on from 5:30-7 p.m. on Wednesday, April 8 and again from 2-3:30 p.m. on Sunday, April 12 in the botanical center.

It bears repeating that being a docent is often described as "one of the most rewarding opportunities you can have as a volunteer." Moreover, you don't have to be a lepidopterist, or for that matter, a public speaker. Many of out visitors are young people just learning to appreciate science. In fact, some of our best docents are young people.

And while we're at it, thanks to all the volunteers who share their time and energy to become a docent.

Still time to join tour group leaving May 15 for tour of English gardens

Katie Steinhoff will be soon be leading a group of travelers from the Ozarks to England as guests of Collette Vacations and the Royal Horticultural Society to view the Gardens of London. There is still room for latecomers.

The tour leaves Springfield on May 15 and returns on May 22, although some participants are staying on in England to visit other areas before returning.

The tour will include an opening day visit to the Chelsea Flower Show, probably the most famous flower show in the world, often visited on opening day by members of the Royal family; a visit to the Royal Botanical Gardens at Kew, probably the world's quintessential Botanical Garden; a visit to Wisley, the magnificent headquarters garden of the Royal Horticultural Society, and famous in May for its Rhododendrons and Azaleas; a visit to Hampton Court and the Dutch-influenced formal gardens of William and Mary, although don't forget the earlier Tudor maze; and a visit to Windsor Castle's magnificent English garden at Savill in the Great Park.

Non-profits from across southern Missouri will have the chance to raise funds, compete for matches and prizes, and be a part of a one-day surge in generosity across our state. The inaugural

Give Ozarks is scheduled for Tuesday, May 5, 2015.

Friends of the Garden is pleased to have been chosen as one of 24 agencies to receive a dollar-for-dollar match from the CFO. Up to \$5,000 in matching funds will be used to grow our Anne Drummond Endowment Fund currently held at the CFO. As our gardens grow, so does the need for maintenance and enhancements of all 35-plus gardens and attractions. Growing this endowment fund will better enable us to sustain, long into the future, the 112-acre Springfield Botanical Gardens that thousands of people enjoy each year.

Look for these gardens to be in bloom when planning your visit

This time of year, you're likely to find something of interest in the botanical gardens. Each collection has its own cell phone signage and a prompt number to hear a brief description. Watch for geese, and please don't feed them. A map is on page 8.

Here's a listing of gardens that should be blooming for the remainder of 2015:

- •Early April: Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden opens. Dogwoods, azaleas, and bulbs begin to bloom. Hostas are beginning to grow.
- Early May: Iris, peonies and roses are blooming; Roston Native Butterfly

House opens on National Public Garden

- **Tune:** MSU Trial Gardens, English and White Gardens and summer annuals begin to bloom.
- •Mid-June: Daylilies and Asiatic lilies bloom spectacularly for about six weeks.
- •Mid-July: Join us for the 7th annual Friends of the Garden Butterfly Festival. Enjoy hostas in the deep shade of the fenced walnut grove.
- •August: Tropical plants and flowering bushes in bloom, including cannas, hibiscus, crepe myrtle, hydrangea, butterfly bush and rose of Sharon. Annuals and wildflowers in bloom. Butterflies active.
- •September: Japanese Fall Festival; Gray-Campbell Farmstead 1860's

Lifestyle Expo; Monarch Butterfly tagging and closing of the Butterfly House. Visit the Ornamental Grass Garden.

- •October: Enjoy beautiful fall foliage and prairie activity. Mums in bloom. Roses return.
- •November: Watch birds harvest seeds from the Ornamental Grass Garden. The Dwarf Conifer Garden is evergreen.
- December: Christmas activities and Holiday Train Display inside the atrium.

The 'people' side of public gardens is where we come to learn

A Parks Perspective **Katie Steinhoff**

Growing gardeners and nature enthusiasts can be tough work. As someone who spends as much time tending to people as I do to the plants in the garden, I should be proud to report that research suggests that children are more empathic to environmental issues than ever reported in history.

Their interest must be related to their participation in programs and activities at the botanical gardens, right?

However, research also suggests that children are spending nearly 50 percent less time outdoors than previous generations. Which leads me to wonder: How will the next generation care for our resources if they don't have that personal experience and ongoing engagement in the world around them? In this month's

column, I'd like to explore the concept of how we grow the people in our public garden, in taking from the famous quote by Baba Dioum, "In the end, we will conserve only what we love. We will love only what we understand. We will understand only what we are taught."

Through the sponsorship of the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) and the Missouri Parks and Recreation Association (MPRA), Springfield has had the good fortune to glean insight from industry experts in the areas of increasing cultural/ethnic diversity in nature and increasing activity in our communities in recent weeks.

In my mind, serving all people in the community by providing opportunity to connect with nature, through gardening, wildlife viewing and a place to be active in a safe environment is an area of concern that botanical gardens are uniquely poised to address.

John Robinson, guest speaker of MDC and a self-identified "black bird-watcher," noted that children need permission to explore. Especially minority children, who may not have ready





access to environments that attract a variety of birds or wildlife; they need someone to repeatedly encourage them through spaces or environments that might be foreign or uncomfortable. In a poll conducted by the Nature Conservancy, 80 percent of children reported that they avoid outdoors because of heat and



insects. This brings to mind a quote from Rachel Carson, author of Silent Spring, "Those who contemplate the beauty of the earth find reserves of strength that will endure as long as life lasts."

If we are going to cultivate strong citizens, they cannot be allowed to wimp out for weather or insects. In a similar vein, Mark Fenton, guest speaker with MPRA, advised of the direct correlation of trying to protect children from "danger" by driving them everyplace has led to the rise of obesity, inactivity, and associated diseases. People need more walk and bike friendly communities. People need safe access to nature and the community and encouragement to explore.

Friends of the Garden, Master Gardeners of Greene County and several of our park partners who grow and maintain gardens at the Springfield Botanical Gardens at Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park will provide opportunities for people to explore in a few upcoming events. National Public Gardens Day and season opening for the Dr. Roston Native Butterfly House is coming up on May 8. The Master Gardeners of Greene County have traditionally adopted National Kids to Parks Day on May 16 as days to host activity stations and volunteers to encourage all, but especially kids, to connect with nature. Hope to see you in the gardens soon.

Rain Garden gets a cleansing by fire

Recent visitors may have noticed that we have burned the rain garden. While we do a controlled burn in the Prairie Garden every winter, this is the first time we have done a controlled burn in the rain garden (adjacent to the Botanical Center). It should give us a more vibrant rain garden this summer, and will probably help the buffalo grass around the Rain Garden, which has proved to be a very successful part of our green intentions with the Botanical Center. Swales collect all the oily toxins from the parking lots around the Botanical Center and pipe them into the rain garden every time we get substantial rainfall. There, it percolates into the ground through natural native plants that cleanse it. The water then reappears halfway down the Great Lawn as pure rain water and helps keep our "Great Lawn" green. Of course, some of you have been following the lives of our feral cat family that live in the drain, running from the parking lot to the Rain Garden. The big tabby cat seems to have survived the winter well, and is now answering to the name "Oscar," was not burned out. We made sure that the drain was sealed before we implemented the burn."
