This event is the same day as the the Ozark Daylily Society Show June 27-28, which includes the annual Daylily Sale, so you may want to enjoy both events.


### Seventh year for Butterfly Festival

Dr. Chris Barnhart was recently honored by Missouri State University, as the recipient of 2015 Board of Governors' Award for Public Affairs. Thanks to Chris and Debra, his wife, we now have an important education attraction at the gardens.

For those who may be new to Friends of the Garden, the Roston Native Butterfly House is located just a short walk southeast of the Springfield Botanical Center in Close Memorial Park. In addition to attracting thousands of visitors, the house is an educational resource, free of charge to visitors (although we welcome donations), and operated by more than 40



docents. The Butterfly House is a great resource for teachers. The house welcomes more than 24,000 visitors

trained

annually. The seventh annual Friends of the Garden Butterfly Festival on July 11 will again introduce thousands of visitors to these beautiful creatures.

As curator, Chris provides training for docents in addition to raising thousands of butterflies and moths in all stages for display, along with interpretive materials and infrastructure.

For the first time in 2015, thanks to Chris and MSU, FOG has the funds for a paid intern who will work throughout the season. Chris and Missouri State University helped raise \$5,704 online to fund an intern. Applicants are being interviewed now, and Chris has pledged the \$1,700 from the award to be used for2016.

"We display the entire life cycle of native species, complete with host plants, predators and parasites, and use these to teach ecological lessons and the importance of native wildlife," explains Chris.

But it wouldn't happen each year without Chris and Deb Barnhart.

# A big Thank You for Ozarks First!

This is a busy time of year at the Springfield Botanical Gardens, but before I write another word: Thank you!

This is a very special thank you to all of you who found a way to support Friends of the Garden during the recent Give Ozarks online crowd-funding campaign. Thanks to you, we not

only met our goal, we exceeded it two-fold,

receiving more than \$15,790 in in contributions during a 24-hour period. Of that, more than \$10,000 came from our own members.

Also, in the category of total gifts received during the 24 hour period, FOG received 224 total gifts, which is the fifth highest of the 150 agencies. Out of all the participating organizations, we were 15th in total donations. You can view all of the results at GiveOzarks.org/Leaderboard.

Now that's how we celebrate Cinco de Mayo in the Ozarks, but of course we had help. Being chosen as one of only 24 agency partners out of a total of 150 participating groups to receive a matching grant from the Community Foundation of the Ozarks was a huge incentive.

Overall, Give Ozarks raised a total of \$1,018,962. That's amazing, and the good works to follow will make a difference throughout many communities.

But there's more good financial news. Thanks to the support of our partner, Missouri State University, in the Roston Butterfly House, and MSU's Dr. Chris



Barnhart, a FOG board member, we have raised \$5,704 to hire an intern to help us in the butterfly house this season. Applicants are being interviewed now and we should have a decision shortly after you read this.

Moreover, Dr. Barnhart was recently awarded the Public Affairs Award by MSU, recognizing his work in the gardens and in the community. For that, he received a \$1,700 cash award that he has pledged toward continuing the internship next year. This is a great honor for Chris, and a remarkable testimony to the thousands of hours he and Debra Barnhart have donated through Friends of the Garden.

# Discovering a world of gardens is critical, here and there, everywhere

One of the most pivotal experiences in shaping my career path happened while I was an intern at the Missouri Botanical Garden in St. Louis.

Interns were housed in an apartment just outside the garden gate, and across the street lived an 8-year-old boy named Tony.

One day, Tony convinced me and his grandmother to allow me to take him to the gardens. After all, it was Henry Shaw's 200th birthday (in 2000), so there was a lot to see in the garden on that day.

To my amazement, Tony was discovering an entire new world that was less than 200 yards from his front door. Honeybees and blueberries on shrubs

were as foreign as the Japanese Garden or Climatron rain forest. Everything was

new to him inside the garden. It was this experience that helped me appreciate the critical need for a botanical garden in every community and how I decided to work in public gardens.

Public gardens aren't just beautiful places to visit, but they are critical for every community. Not only for the urban child who may not have any other way to experience plants, but horticultural science skills are needed to improve our food supply, and address the environmental issues of water quality and habitat loss especially of the monarch butterfly.

If you've followed the Friends of the Garden for the past 15 years, you might be familiar with the tagline, "Celebrating the Beauty of the Ozarks!" At this stage of the development of the Springfield Botanical Gardens, our acquisitions have been largely native plantings, hardy to USDA zone 6A and/or adaptable to the extreme Midwest climatic conditions. We can tell many stories that people can relate to with our gardens.

- The butterfly house helps us understand the micro cosmos happening in our back yards as we study the interrelationships between plants and wildlife.


