'Growing Strong' weekend has much to offer

It hardly seems possible, but five years ago the Botanical Center Building was dedicated on the Great Lawn with Judy Collins at the keyboard. And 15 years ago, Friends of the Garden was organized to provide fund-raising support and hands-on development of the gardens.

Three decades ago, the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden opened (1985, followed by the Japanese Fall Festival in 1995, organized by the Springfield Sister Cities Association). Thus what is now the Springfield Botanical Gardens, bringing together Nathanael Greene Park and the Close Memorial Gardens to a nationally acclaimed public garden.



Now it's time for our 1,200 members to celebrate. *Growing Strong* is the theme of events on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 2 & 3, 2015. On Friday evening, there will be a reception, dinner, and silent auction at the Darr Agricultural Center (\$60).

The keynote speaker will be a familiar name, garden designer Tres Fromme who is featured in this summer's edition of *Garden Design* magazine. Those attending the event will receive an elegant full-color history of the gardens (\$10 in the Botanical Boutique after the banquet), along with a family membership to use or gift some special gardener.

On Saturday, Oct. 3, a garden symposium (\$35) featuring Fromme, Lenora Larson, from Paola, Kan., and Patrick Byers, MU Extension Horticulturist from the Ozarks. (Learn more about them on page 7).

Lunch will be served on the rooftop plaza by Farmers Gastropub. There will be garden tours and a variety of activities for all ages,


"I first got to know Glenn when I coordinated the Hotline in 2012," says Lisa Bakerink, the new executive director of FOG. "He created and maintained an Excel database for all our hotline inquiries."

The information the database contained provided several different ways to search by person, topic, or geographic area. Glenn also maintains the roster of nearly 300 Master Gardener members.

In addition to helping in the Master Gardeners Demonstration Garden, Glenn's gardens have been featured on garden tour. He's also active in Friends of MU Extension in Greene County, the group's fund-raising arm.

often done behind the scenes. Glenn also does things like digging and installing irrigation lines and then follows through on the project until he knows everything is working properly.

"Glenn is also a great asset to Patrick Byers and me," adds Kelly. "He meticulously keeps the Master Gardener roster up to date and well organized, which is a huge job considering the chapter has nearly 300 members. He also keeps the online volunteer hours reporting system used by the Master Gardeners running like a well-oiled machine. This is also a huge job since there are many different categories of volunteer hours and each one must be entered separately."

completion and the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden.



'Envirothon' competitors look for answers in Botanical Gardens

A five-member team of high schools students from Pembroke Hill High School in Kansas City, Mo., won top honors in the 2015 National Conservation Foundation Envirothon hosted by Missouri State University in Springfield.

The week-long North American natural resource education competition working in partnership with local conservation districts, forestry associations, educators and cooperating natural resources agencies to organize and conduct competitions on the local, regional, state and/or provincial level. Among them was the Springfield

Botanical Gardens. Smithfield Foods sponsored the competition this year.

The Envirothon is North America's largest high school environmental education competition. The top winning teams were announced during the award ceremonies at MSU. More than 4,000 high schools were involved across North America.

The competition featured 52 fiveman teams from 44 states and eight Canadian provinces.

Theresa Dunlap, a Missouri State Envirothon Committee member, explains that the Envirothon moves each year around the U.S. and Canada. Next year the competition visits Ontario, Canada. Dunlap explains that Springfield was a better fit than larger metropolitan areas that were considered.

"It's an environmental competition, and with all of the natural resources that we have in the Ozarks and just the beauty of nature in the Ozarks is something very attractive that we kind of wanted to show off in our state," Dunlap says.

The students in the competition move through five ecostations: wildlife, forestry, soils and land use, aquatic ecology and a current issue theme, which this year was urban forestry, and answer questions at each site. They also made an oral presentation.

An uncommon phenomenon not to be taken for granted

I think most people will understand what I mean about taking good things for granted. As a Springfield transplant, I can assure you that the resources and relationships that are being built around this *Celebration of the Beauty of the Ozarks* is an uncommon phenomenon not to be taken for granted.

The partnerships at work in this community are something for which each of us should be proud. I was recently asked if there is a model in the public garden

world where many different agencies contribute something to make one great thing. After thinking about it, I think we are it.

I'd like to share my perspective on the big picture for the future of the Springfield Botanical Gardens.

First, we would not have a botanical garden without the Springfield-Greene County Parks department. Without the community support for a sales tax, we would never have the funding to operate a property that hosts more than 500 events and 400,000 visitors each year. Of course, it was the ¼-cent storm

water and parks capital improvements sales tax that helped us reach the funding goal needed to build the Botanical Center that functions as the welcome and education center for our gardens. If we are going to have a botanical garden, we need your support for parks.

Next, we would not have a botanical garden without our education partners. The expertise we gain by working with our local and state universities is the most important bridge for connecting the community to our garden collections.

We could not have the Native Butterfly House without the expert guidance provided by Missouri State University's Dr. Chris Barnhart. MSU also hosted a crowd funding opportunity to pay a docent in the house all summer. Stuart Beezley was able to reach thousands of visitors who might have otherwise found the butterfly house closed for lack of volunteer availability.

Of immediate concern, as a Botanical Center resident, the Greene County Extension office is still in jeopardy of not having sufficient funding. The University of Missouri sends faculty, paid for by their budget, to provide research-based continuing education in Greene County.

This is a huge value having educators and researchers that take an interest in your wellbeing. Whether you tap the advice of the Master Gardeners to create a program for your civic group or ask them a question about what's going on in your garden; or if you participate in the number of different classes the Extension specialists offer, if we are going to have a

botanical garden, we need support from the Greene County Commission and/or from you.

Last, we would not have a botanical garden without the Friends of the Garden and our park partners who take individual care of each garden and attraction you find throughout the Springfield Botanical Gardens at Nathanael Greene/Close Memorial Park.

If you wanted to try and put a value on all their efforts, our volunteers reported more than 26,000 hours of service to the growth and maintenance of the park. Using the government standard value for a volunteer in Missouri of \$22.55/hr, that's a value of \$586,300.

Not only are our partners providing the labor, but virtually all of our garden partners raise their own funds to purchase plants and build the gardens and structures in the park.

Your Friends of the Garden membership dollars, your purchases at plants sales that happen at the gardens, your attendance at the "Americana in the Springfield Botanical Gardens" concert series, your participation in other garden events and fundraisers, are all very important if we are going to have a botanical garden.

If you love it, please find a way to support it with your time, talent or treasure.

'Growing Strong' presenters bring array of insights

Growing Strong, a gardening symposium on Oct. 2-3, was conceived and planned by gardeners for gardeners and others with a serious interest in plants.

Three well-qualified speakers will share their perspective on gardening. Meet them here:

Lenora Larson: This veteran gardener lives on Long Lips Farm west of Paola, Kansas, a breath-taking four-acre pollinator garden set in a rural 27-acre property that includes pasture, lake, swamp and hardwood forest. An artist as well as gardener, Lenora's home is well-traveled, having been moved 3.5 miles to its current location. It overlooks a scenic lake constructed during the Work Progress Administration (WPA).

Lenora grows more than than 500 plants. Most of them she knows by name (including their scientific name), including many natives that populate her gardens certified by the North American Butterfly Association and Monarch Watch at the University of Kansas in nearby Lawrence. Butterflies and moths populate this sanctuary in season.

Lenora is a member of Miami County Master Gardeners and a frequent speaker to gardeners. She is a graduate of Michigan State University.

Patrick Byers: To say that Patrick is merely well-traveled is to miss the point. Since 2008, he has been a Regional Horticulture Specialist in Southwest Missouri. His responsibilities include outreach programming as well commercial and home horticulture education in the 17-county Southwest region of Missouri, offering assistance to horticulture growers as well as homeowners on such topics as soil testing, disease diagnoses, and pest control recommendations. He is a Master Gardener coordinator for largest and most active chapter in southwest region and a board member of Friends of the Garden. His travels for the U.S. Agency for International Development Farmer to Farmer Program include Uzbekistan (2003,2004); Azerbaijan, 2006, 2007; Lebanon, 2010, 2012 and 2013. He was a participant in an educational exchange to China (2005), organized by Missouri





State University and Ningxia Forestry Institute. From 1989-2008, he worked for Department of Agriculture, Missouri State University, Mountain Grove as a Fruit Grower Adviser. directing fruit production research, particularly in the development of non-traditional fruit industries.

He has also worked for the University of Arkansas Fruit Substation, Clarksville; University of Arkansas, Fayetteville as a graduate assistant in the Department of Horticulture; and Southwest Missouri State University (now MSU) State Fruit Experiment Station, Mountain Grove.

Tres Fromme: For more than 15 years Tres has been planning and designing public garden projects with exceptional levels of creativity, multi-disciplinary collaboration, extensive group participation, and concern for functionality. He is the Landscape Design and Planning Manager for the Atlanta Botanical Garden. He believes compelling gardens result from skillfully choreographed layers of sight, smell, taste, and emotive associations that span the seasons and the years. Tres will share various ways to infuse your personal landscape with sensual richness and drama.
