'Give Ozarks' offers online fund-raising for Sensory/Kitchen Garden


Friends of the Garden will again benefit from the second annual online *Give Ozarks* event conducted by the Community Foundation of the Ozarks.

Proceeds given on behalf of Friends of the Garden during the 24-hour online fundraising marathon on Tuesday, May 3, 2016, will go to help fund the planned Sensory/Garden.

About 200 non-profit agencies in the Ozarks, up from 150 the first year, are participating in the marathon to raise both money and awareness of philanthropy.

A year ago, FOG received \$15,790 in in contributions during the 24-hour period. Of that, more than \$10,000 came from our own members. FOG received 224 total

gifts, the fifth highest of the 150 agencies. Out of all the participating organizations, FOG was 15th in total donations. All told,

Trip to Mexico raises \$2,500 from Sister Cities Association

The relationship between Friends of the Garden and the Springfield Sister Cities Association continues to grow.

On March 11, Michael Thomas, president of SSCA, presented Executive Director Lisa Bakerink with a very large symbolic check for \$2,500, proceeds of a recent excursion to Tlaquepaque, Mexico. The trip included members of both organizations, with a visit to the winter home of Monarch butterflies as part of the adventure into Central Mexico.

"This is an exciting partnership that should benefit both organizations as we continue to sponsor trips like these together," Lisa wrote in an e-mail.

The following week, it was also announced that beginning in May, Cindy Jobe, Executive Director for SSCA, will have an office at the Botanical Center.

'Peace Through People Pavilion' will be a partnership among many friends

The latest partnership between Friends of the Garden and the Springfield Sister Cities Association (SSCA) has been approved by the board, so that construction can begin by late spring.

The "Peace Through People Pavilion" already has an obvious footprint just east of the Botanical Center parking lot where site preparation began late last summer. (See graphic on front page.)

SSCA is funding half of the project and Friends of the Garden is funding half through a memorial established by Tom Finnie in memory of his wife, Kay Finnie. In memory of Kay, Tom has taken an active role in developing the pavilion adjacent to the Dogwood Garden. He has served as president of both organizations.

"This is not a stand alone building," explains Tom. "It is part of the Botanical Gardens."

Tim Rosenbury is the architect for the pavilion building. Frank Zanaboni Jr., a landscape architect who designed the project, described the setting in detail, referring to a conceptual drawing on the front page of this newsletter. The Master Plan Committee has approved, as has the

FOG board. Among the obvious highlights is a commitment to trees and shrubs as well as hardscape.

Seating could accommodate 400-500 persons for a wedding or concert or other events.

SSCA and FOG have been cooperating on both projects and events.

"Sister Cities does have a different mission, but there is plenty of room for overlap," says Cindy Jobe, executive director, whose office is relocating to the botanical center in early May. You can reach her at cjobe@springfieldmo.gov.

The Springfield/Greene County Parks Department definitely does not miss a chance to participate in "National...Day." In this article, I'd like

to share some of the upcoming events and opportunities to participate in parks.

For those of you who have come to one of the Friends of the Garden's board meetings, you will know that the heading for the agenda each

month includes the Friends of the Garden's mission and vision as well as the Springfield-Greene County Park Board's mission statement: ...committed to provide the highest quality of leisure opportunities, to offer programs for relaxation as well as stimulation and to encourage personal and community enrichment for the citizens of Springfield. This statement fits the Botanical Gardens just as much as it fits the parks' family centers and other

special facilities.

The Botanical Garden is a great place for quiet meditation, learning, as well as exercise and our volunteers find personal enrichment by maintaining our public gardens. However, the Springfield Botanical Gardens is more than just a garden, so let me share more about what else you can do:

• April is National Kite Flying month. You can fly a kite almost any day at the gardens, we take the first Saturday of April to celebrate the annual re-opening of the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden with the Cherry Blossom Kite Festival. The gardens are open for free on this day and the Springfield Sister Cities Association hosts a variety of activities on the Botanical Center roof plaza and great lawn between 11 a.m.-3 p.m. on Saturday, April 2 (see page 4).

• April 10-16 is National Volunteer Appreciation week.

We can't say enough about how much we appreciate our volunteers. Last year, they reported more than 22,000 hours of service to the gardens. We traditionally recognize them with a lunch and program on the last Friday in April. This gathering fits nicely as many of our volunteers are in the park that day setting up for the Plant Sale and it coincides with National Arbor Day.

• Earth Day on April 22, and this year, Kelly McGown and I are planning a special volunteer experience. We will invite existing volunteers, the general public and local businesses to give back to the Earth by removing invasive species, protecting our streams from run-off by replacing mulch and pea gravel, and plantings. The




day will begin with an orientation about the gardens and then they will get a chance to have a garden experience. I think it will run from 9 a.m. until noon. The general public will get a chance to get their hands dirty on a project that will be good for the Earth and good for our gardens.

- May 3 is Give Ozarks Day (learn details in a story on page 1 of this newsletter) as well as National Mediate in a Garden Day. If you remember from last year, it was a chance to support Friends of the Garden, Greene County Extension and the Springfield-Greene County Park Board, along with a number of non-profit organizations to build their endowments and other funds through the Community Foundation of the Ozarks.
- May 6 is National Public Gardens Day. We've made a point to open the Dr. Roston Native Butterfly House on that day as well as provide a member event for Friends of the Garden and Garden tours.
- One of the finest amenities that specifically allow the Springfield Botanical Gardens to fulfill the park's mission is access to more than eight miles of linear park via the South Creek Greenway Trail. This National Recreation Trail designated by the National Parks Service is a great place to spot birds and wildlife. Bike, rollerblade, run, walk or jog, Ozark Greenways is another important partner with the Springfield-Greene County Parks, celebrating its 25 year in 2016.
- May is National Bike Month. Within that month, there is a Bike to Work Week, May 16-20.
- **June 4th is National Trails Day** and we will be celebrating Ozark Greenways 25th anniversary with the new connection between the Wilson Creek Trail and the South Creek Trail.


Whether you take time to participate in any of the upcoming activities or not, just remember we have a great park system that you can enjoy daily from sunrise to sunset! Love our Parks.
