

Before that he was a traveler whose life seemingly has been one adventure after another, from studies at Cambridge for the priesthood in the Anglican Church to licensed lay reader, estate manager Manager of Tullamaine Castle in County Tipperary, Ireland; cruise director on the Queen Elizabeth

"I have been privileged to work with Peter for nearly six years now and I could go on about his many abilities, talents, and grit in getting work accomplished in the gardens," says Lisa Bakerink. Host Lions Club honors McAuliffe for her passion to explore space

For the past 25 years, one of our earliest supporters of what we now call the Springfield Botanical Gardens has been the Springfield Host Lions Club, founded in 1921, the first Lions Club in Springfield.

This year, the Host Lions Club will honor a beloved teacher who died at 37. The late Sharon Christa Corrigan McAuliffe was the first teacher chosen to fly in space, aboard the Space Shuttle Challenger. Tragically, she was one of the seven crew members who perished when the shuttle exploded on Jan. 28, 1986. As an American history teacher who wore science on her sleeve, she wrote on her application form to NASA: "I watched the Space

Age being born, and I would like to participate."

She will be honored with a stone in ceremonies at 5:30 p.m. on June 22. The History Walk is a long-term project that memorializes "Americans Who Have Made A Difference" in one of the two adjoining parks, Nathanael Greene Park. The Close Memorial Gardens were added in 1998. Today, the two operate as one as the Springfield Botanical Gardens.

Since 1992, the Host Lions Club has placed an etched stone honoring a historic figure. Nearly 30 stones account for America's heroes, beginning with Lions Club founder Melvin Jones. Helen Keller, George Washington Carver, Harry S Truman and many others help bring history alive.

In 2016, the Host Lions Club honored Linus Pauling, the only recipient of two Nobel Prizes, who developed the polio vaccine and was awarded the prize for chemistry in 1954, followed by the Nobel Peace Prize in 1962.

We have installed a new water fountain for our furry friends, chimney towers for our feathered friends and the solar tram is up and running for everyone who wants to take part in this amazing space.

What is truly extraordinary are the many people that make all this happen. The Springfield Botanical Gardens are the beneficiary of a unique synergy resulting in a force of staff and volunteers who create the "magic."

Friends of the Garden, the Springfield/Greene County Park Board and the MU Extension all bring talented, educated, passionate staff and volunteers who contribute the time, expertise and dollars that create this tucked away jewel of Springfield.

But that's not all; we have 24-plus park partner organizations, including floral societies that have been honored with national recognition, musicians who entertain us and historians standing by to educate us. More than 20, 528 hours of volunteer time were reported in 2016. We have an impressive amount of blood, sweat and tears being poured into our 112 acres.

Although Mother's Day provide a clear reminder that the word is out – a very tricky day to find a parking spot – I encourage you to be sure those in your circle of friends know of this extraordinary place.

Friends of the Garden exceeds goals in third annual 'Give Ozarks'

Friends of the Garden and the Springfield Botanical Gardens raised \$13,172 through the *Give Ozarks* campaign, including a one-to-one matching grant for all online donations of \$5,000.



More than 220 nonprofits from across the Ozarks participated in the campaign.

FOG, MU Extension and Grey-Campbell Farmstead combined to

share in the "Spirit Award." FOG ranked 20th in total dollars raised and 18th in the number of gifts given. Thanks to all of you who helped us reach these goals.

This is the third year for the event, sponsored by the Community Foundation of the Ozarks (CFO).

In Give Ozarks' first two years, thousands of donors have supported hundreds of nonprofits to the tune of more

than \$2.2 million. The Give Ozarks campaign finished with a total of \$1,397,147 in donations for all participating agencies.

As our gardens grow and expand, so does the need for maintenance and enhancements of all 35-plus gardens and attractions. Growing our endowment fund enables us to sustain the 112-acre Springfield Botanical Gardens that thousands of people enjoy each year.

All of the funds raised help support the Friends of the Garden Growth & Maintenance Fund at the CFO.

The Give Ozarks campaign was part of the *Give Local America Day* when community foundations across the country held similar online fundraising events to boost resources for their local nonprofit members.

Our goal is to encourage new donors as we raise awareness of the importance of philanthropy.

Sensory Garden construction continues; Succulent Garden expands

If you haven't explored the Springfield Botanical Gardens lately, you may have missed two garden projects that are well underway, despite plenty of weather interruptions. Each one has a special mission.

Work continues on Phase One of the Sensory Garden by Nesbitt Construction Co., creating an entry gateway with raised planters and sculpted and stained concrete. Soon natural stone will be added to match the Peace Through People Pavilion and the exterior of the Botanical Center facade.

After years of fund-raising and design discussion, here is a special experience worth watching as this project evolves. Even though we are still working to raise funds to complete the vision, the excitement is building along with the structure



This garden will serve those with physical limitations that might limit a garden experience. A key part of the project is an outdoor kitchen classroom.

Nearby, park staff inspired by Peter Longley, David Middleton along with crews from EarthStone Landscape Materials have expanded the Succulent Garden to encompass three sides of the Botanical Center.

As this new garden proves its stamina in its second year, its beginnings have created that a garden sure to inspire others to give xeriscape gardening a try.

Countless opportunities for growing and giving

It is a privilege to be in a position that allows me to be surrounded by the people who ARE the change they want to see in the world. Everyone is a critic, but there is a special group of people who see a need and actually do something positive about it. This special group of people includes both the paid staff and volunteers who work together to create the Springfield Botanical Gardens. While paid positions are usually few and far between, you might be surprised at all the different ways volunteers make a difference.

Obviously, the gardens, our foundation for building programs and creating magical and memorable experiences gain the most attention when they are beautiful and when they are in disrepair. The garden adopters are the people who drive the seasonal displays as well as the

diversity in our collections. An adopter is rewarded with a living canvas to manage and share with others. We

have nearly 20 garden areas or special features in the park right now that need someone to care for them. Whether your church group or scout troop wants to do something in the community, or you as an individual are looking for some way to make a difference, there are opportunities to serve in a very visible way.

The Garden Committee usually meet sat 10:30 a.m. the second Tuesday at the Botanical Center. We like to start the day in the gardens, meet, and then do lunch. If you are interested, please let me know. The nurturing nature of caring for the gardens can also be extended to caring for our garden's wildlife. Volunteers maintain

the purple martin house, blue bird boxes, and chimney swift towers, by keeping an eye out for predator activity, keeping structures functional and collecting and reporting data on the species. Some volunteers raise caterpillars and plants at home and bring them to the butterfly house. Foiling beaver activity and managing invasive species are open projects for the person who is the change they want to see in the gardens.

Communicators are needed behind the scenes to write articles, interpretive signage and web descriptions, and post to social media. Live communicators are needed to lead butterfly house tours, host in the Gray-Campbell Farmstead, guide children through the Lions Club History Walk and greet people at the desk. There is demand for youth field trips in topics of plants and pollination, adaptations, alien invaders, soils, and the plants we eat as well as walking garden


tours including the Japanese Stroll Garden. Volunteers are welcome to participate in the gardens and even off-site when we receive requests to talk to different groups about our gardens in general and every gardening topic. Teachers are needed year round for these activities and are great for special events like the Kite, Butterfly, and Japanese festivals and 1860s Lifestyles Expo. If you want to share your experience as a garden story teller, we have a position for you!

Speaking of special events, we host themed activities and occasions around the gardens to draw people who don't know yet that they like gardens. Volunteers create flyers; ask for sponsors, donors and vendors to participate in the gardens. Volunteers feed people who work in the gardens and work these events. Volunteers find more volunteers to lead activities or give a program. Volunteers decorate the Japanese Garden for the Romance in the Garden event. Volunteers play music and paint faces. Friends of the Garden have Communications and Development teams that drive these activities.

I appreciate the volunteers who never stop growing and giving. Unexpected skills that volunteers employ are surveying, mapping, inventorying, and documenting our collections. Some volunteers keep tools, equipment and structures operating safely. Volunteers continue to use their skills learned during their career and often applying them to an entirely new subject when they come to the gardens. If you value the Springfield Botanical Gardens or see a need, would you fulfill it?
