Although some might refer to Kelly McGown as an academic, you won't often find her in a classroom.

Kelly McGowan, horticulture educator with MU Extension, received a Master of Science degree in Natural Resources with an emphasis in Agroforestry on Dec. 15, 2017, at the University of Missouri in Columbia. A native of Clinton, Ark., Kelly is also a graduate of Missouri State University.

Her master's thesis, Flower Production and Effect of Flower Harvest in Six American Elderberry (Sambucus Canadensis) Genotypes, continues the research of the University of Missouri for more than 20 years into the health benefits and evaluation of native elderberries.

Kelly is also coordinator of Master Gardeners of Greene County, helping with the premiere demonstration gardens.

"Kelly coordinates volunteers to provide educational tours of the butterfly house to many groups throughout the spring, summer, and fall, often offering her own expertise to these groups," writes Lisa Bakerink.

"She raises many butterflies and moths throughout the season to release into the native butterfly house and she led the monarch butterfly tagging event last fall."

Katie Keith credits Kelly's special talent for program development.

"From her weekly

appearances on KOLR 10 TV at Noon, to the annual Master Gardener training, Organic Gardening Academy and a possible Woodland Stewardship symposium, she understands the requests for more information and pulls together the resources.

"She's not just academic smart, she's street smart, too," adds Katie. "She has been a hands-on worker in the field at the Mt. Vernon experiment station and within our gardens and butterfly house."

"Kelly's knowledge and organization helps keep the Master Gardeners Hotline volunteers informed about what is going on throughout the various season," adds Catherine Banks, volunteer coordinator of Potting Shed University. "She keeps us posted about what people are calling about. That's really important."

She and husband Brent, an engineer, have two daughters, Anna and Lily, students at Kickapoo High School.

Master Gardeners training begins with orientation dates

Training for the 2018 Master Gardener Core Training classes will begin on **Thursday, Feb. 6, 2017,** and run through early April, from 6-9 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday evenings at the Springfield Botanical Center. Information on a separate program, Potting Shed University, is on page 4 of this newsletter.

The cost for the program will be \$160 for an individual or \$275 for couples sharing a manual.

The program fee covers a comprehensive training manual, class handouts, speaker fees and other expenses related to the class. For more information, you may email Kelly McGowan at McgowanK@Missouri.edu, or call her at the the Greene County Extension office at (417) 874-2965.

Orientation sessions will be Tuesday, Jan. 30, 2018 and Thursday, Feb. 1, 2018.

Attendance to one of these orientation sessions is mandatory in order to register.

Community service is at the core of the Master Gardener program in Springfield, and each year brings a new opportunity for area plant and garden enthusiasts to take our Master Gardener training and join our family of volunteers.

You don't have to be an expert gardener to become a member. Participants receive 30 hours of classroom training and pledge to contribute at least 30 hours of volunteer service during their first year. When achieved, you will have earned the title of Certified Master Gardener, and 20 hours annually are required to maintain member status.

As a benefit of continued service, Extension Master Gardeners may attend advanced horticultural training and most educational programs free of charge. Master Gardener Programs are offered through county extension centers throughout Missouri and the U.S.

Pick and choose what interests you at Potting Shed University

Master Gardeners of Greene County are again hosting eight diverse classes this spring to help individuals improve their gardening skills.

Beginning Monday, Feb. 26, programs last for an hour, from 6-7 p.m. at the Springfield-Greene County Botanical Center, 2400 S. Scenic, Springfield. Registration begins at 5:30 p.m. Cost is \$5 per person at the door.



Kelly McGowan, horticulture educator with University of Missouri Extension and coordinator of the Master Gardener chapter, has released the list of upcoming classes and topics in this "Gardening Skills for Life" series.

Feb. 26: "Starting Your Own Kitchen Garden," taught by Pat DeWitt, Master Gardener of Greene County member. This program is for new gardeners or gardeners who are starting over and want to learn the

basic foundations for a successful garden. All participants will receive a handy booklet that contains all the basic information on starting a vegetable garden, a planting calendar, and useful information on challenges and benefits to growing your food. We will discuss ways to store and use the bounty of your harvest.

March 5: "English Gardens," taught by Nora Cox, Master Gardener of Greene County trainee. "Have you ever wanted to enjoy an English Garden of your very own? In this class, participants will learn about varieties and placing of plants that will provide you with the relaxing enjoyment of an English Garden," said Cox.

March 12: "Growing Strawberries," taught by Patrick Byers, MU Extension horticulture specialist. "Strawberries are a versatile and easy-to-grow berry for the Ozarks. We will discuss the best strawberry cultivars for southwest Missouri, preparing a garden spot for strawberries, planting and growing these interesting plants, harvesting a bountiful crop and managing pests, diseases, insects and weeds," said Byers.

March 19: "Companion Planting," taught by Cathy Wolven, Master Gardener of the Ozarks, emeritus member. Find out who likes who in this companion planting class.

March 26: "Using Foliage for Color in the Garden." Taught by Kathryn Kufahl, Master Gardener of the Ozarks, emeritus member. "Plants with colorful foliage can provide interest through the entire season with fairly low maintenance. This session will offer suggestions for both annuals and perennials that provide colorful foliage for your space," said Kufahl.

April 2: "Tried and True Plants of the Ozarks," taught by Melissa Jenkins, Cedarbrook Garden Center, Branson West. "Planting and maintaining a garden in the Ozarks can be a challenge but you don't have to sacrifice beauty for durability. Learn about some of my favorite plants that add true beauty to your gardens year after year without a lot of maintenance and care," said Jenkins.


April 9: "Plants for a Japanese Garden in the Ozarks," taught by Katie Keith, coordinator of the Springfield Botanical Center. "We will discuss the design concepts of the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden, plants for structure in all seasons and extending the bloom season," said Keith.

April 16: "Indoor Gardening: Our Favorite Houseplants and More," taught by Kelly McGowan, MU Extension horticultural educator. "We will learn about houseplant history, common insect pests, durable varieties and all aspects of care and propagation during this class," said McGowan.

The Master Gardener program is a popular statewide volunteer community-service organization administered through University of Missouri Extension. The organization's goal is to train gardeners who are willing to share their knowledge with others. Master Gardeners become volunteers of University of Missouri Extension and donate hours for community educational projects in horticulture. Crystal Bridges Museum Horticulturalist keynote speaker for MG state conference

Cody George, Crystal Bridges Museum Horticulturalist, will be the keynote

speaker for the 2018 Missouri Master Gardener State Conference.

Although George quips that the plant species he most identifies with is "spicebush...we both enjoy being in the shade, but do fine in the sun. And we both emit a pleasant, spicy fragrance," he's introduced 60-plus taxa of native plants to the museum's living collection and is responsible for the creation of Crystal Bridges Museum's monthly series, Discover the Grounds.

George joined the Crystal Bridges Trails and Grounds team as horticulturist in the winter of 2011.

After completing the initial landscape installation of 320 species of plants to the museum grounds, George has introduced more than 60 varieties of native plants to

the museum's living collection, with a focus on the genus Trillium (12 species) and Magnolia (six species). He has discovered and resurrected several of Dr. Neil Compton's original test beds for native plants and installed the certified Monarch Way Station featuring 250 individual plant specimens of Asclepias (milkweed).

George grew up on 40 acres in Northeast Arkansas, graduating with a bachelor's degree in horticulture from the University of Arkansas in 2006.

After working in the nursery industry for nearly seven years, he was named head gardener for Compton Gardens in Bentonville before joining Crystal Bridges. He and his family live and garden in Bella Vista, Ark.

Now you can explore your favorite garden at **SGFBot.org**. Just follow the blue dot on your smart phone for a virtual tour

I love maps! I could stare at maps for hours, plotting trips, following river cuts and geological patterns, lining up points of interest and creating best routes for even something as simple as the daily errand run.

I also love a good story! Some of my favorite books and movies are about following a map to a buried treasure or finding the key to unlock secret information.

For me, the 'map and story" visitor experience is what compels me to visit different botanical gardens. I enjoy connecting the dots and finding out where the trail will lead. This month, I will share the Springfield Botanical Gardens journey of transformation for

our maps and interpretive information, especially over the past year.

Eight years ago, when the Botanical Center was nearing opening day, park leadership knew that the two full-time positions initially hired for this facility would not be able to serve the demand for information and services of the already existing botanical gardens within a public park that was open daily from sunrise to sunset.

The Guide by Cell program was purchased to help visitors self-guide through the gardens scattered about the park and connect with the volunteers or plant societies that maintained those spaces by

We developed nearly a hundred recorded stories about the different features of each garden area. Printed maps were adjusted to

follow the prompt number. Visitors could call one central phone

dialing a phone number.

number and hear a story about the different features of the park when they matched up the correct prompt.

As the Friends of the Garden sponsorship program was first.

As the Friends of the Garden sponsorship program was first aimed on updating the garden entry signs that posted the phone number and prompt at each garden, we re-evaluated the usefulness of the Guide by Cell program.

The Friends of the Gardens' Communication Committee was sure we could offer more and maybe even save money. We considered smart phone apps, but realized that taking people directly to a web page would be the best bet on financial and staff time output.

Newly hired Parks Web Designer Pam Montanez took on the challenge of creating and storing the existing Guide by Cell sound files into a web format. She created a story page for each garden that includes photographs, written descriptions, the sound file and information about the garden sponsor.

To make accessing this information as easy as possible, a QR code and a short URL web address were created, so people could either scan the code or type the short address, **SGFBot.org** into their smart phone. Either way, your phone will display the pictures, stories and sounds accompanying that garden as well as a Google Map to show the gardens' location and your proximity to that garden. Following the blue dot on your phone screen, you can more easily find your way to the next attraction of your choice.

While we will continue to print paper maps and offer guided tram and walking tours, I hope you will find the fun and convenience of having more information about the gardens you love at your fingertips.

Ultimately, the goal is for all people to find meaning and connections in their life and see the value in the Springfield Botanical Gardens.


