Japanese Stroll Garden will re-open four weekends in December for nighttime viewing

For the first time ever, beginning Nov. 30 and for three following weekends, the Mizumoto Japanese Stroll Garden will be open for extended seasonal hours from 5:30-8:30 p.m. each Friday and Saturday.

This year, seasonal lighting has been added to create a new experience for visitors to enjoy along new concrete pathways.

Admission will be the same as for the regular season: \$4 for adults and children under 12 admitted free. Friends of the Garden (FOG) members may show their membership card to enjoy free admission, one of several benefits of membership. FOG volunteers will be on hand to greet visitors at the gate and to provide information. If you would like to volunteer for this event, call FOG at 417-874-2952.

Note: The garden is normally closed from November through March and will not be open to the public except during the evening hours of this event.

The new pathways are the first phase of several planned improvements as part of the Springfield Botanical Garde's master plan. Future unfunded plans also include renovation of the three ponds in the garden to repair leaks.

The remaining pathways will be completed next year, thanks to the generosity of Conco Companies, which has donated 50 percent of the cost of concrete. Carson-Mitchell Inc. is doing the site preparation and installation, as well as relocating the Azumaya from the Busch Municipal Building to a new location adjacent to the stroll garden. The relocation is being done at no cost to the Botanical Gardens.

The long-awaited widening and upgrade of the north access road (details are in the map on page 8) links the Japanese Stroll Garden to the Springfield Botanical Gardens entrance on Scenic Avenue

If Carl Redmon were in a scouting organization, he would own every badge available and gone past the Eagle designation years ago.

Carl, however, is a Master Gardener. Has been since 2000. To list his accomplishments would take the entirety of this newsletter. Not only time, Carl uses his personal trailers behind his gleaming red pickup to transport plants, mulch and whatever else needs moving for the good of the annual plant sale, the Water Wise Garden or, especially this last season, the Master Gardener Demonstration Garden at the Springfield Botanical Gardens.

"Last fall I was asked to take over this garden, then realized what we had to do," he said. "We've had lots of help and been able to bring it back to what it should be."

Carl had been in charge of the sprawling garden once before so he had intimate knowledge of the many styles of gardening the public can learn from in the second oldest garden in the park.

"With Nancy Chambers as co-chair of the garden, we wanted to bring it back to the purpose and mission as an outreach arm of the University of Missouri Extension," he said.

"Carl has done a phenomenal job with the garden, including taking care of projects that weren't necessarily glamorous but needed to be done," says Kelly McGowan, horticulture specialist with the MU Extension in Greene County.

An example: Redmon was involved in the installation of a turf test plot that was adorned with statues and surrounded by a boxwood hedge. In his second go-round No shrinking violet when it comes to volunteer leadership, Master Gardener Carl Redmon has stepped up time after time to share his knowledge and passion for gardening. This year more than 1,400 pounds of produce was harvested and donated to three food pantries.

as coordinator, he brought together more than 30 master gardeners to learn from Katie Keith, Botanical Center Coordinator, how to prune the out-ofcontrol boxwoods.

As a new pathway was to go through the test plot, some plants needed to be removed for access, an adventure that required a volunteer's heavy-duty pickup and a strong rope. Subsequent workdays were devoted to painting the statues, mulching pathways and preparing for a new entry at that north end of the garden.

The vegetable garden has undergone a similar transformation. New drip irrigation systems allow for demonstrating new techniques that have resulted in more than 1,400 pounds of produce being harvested and donated to three food pantries. Redmon also oversees a community garden at the Wesley United Methodist Church that he designed and built. At home, he raises vegetables, with all production going to the food pantries. "We've donated more than 4,000 pounds this year from the three gardens," he says.

Carl was persuaded to run for the Master Gardener chapter board last year, was elected and subsequently accepted the Demonstration Garden position. In his bio for that election he wrote, "I am retired. I think." After this prodigious accomplishment, he is again saying he'll step away. "I'll be around to advise, to mentor," he says. "I'm 82, you know."



A Parks Perspective: Katie Keith

Being surrounded by the reflecting pool in the Great Hall at Crystal Bridges in Bentonville, Ark., on the Springfield-Greene County Botanical Center's eighth birthday was emotional for me as I interacted with peer institutions participating in the American Public Garden Association symposium theme, "From the Ground Up."

Each of us shared experiences of managing living landscapes and the impacts of visitors and of the environment and discussed strategies for continued growth.

The programming began at the Tulsa Botanic Garden where a record-setting monarch butterfly count was observed and our hearts were going out to the gulf coast as hurricane Michael was no doubt hitting unique landscape systems for our country.

Gardens are purposeful places of awe and wonderment as well as repositories for rare and endangered plants and butterflies that become more obvious when disasters hit.

Public gardens are indispensable, yet we are challenged to give our gardens' struggle a voice. We serve an overwhelming audience! In fact, annual visitation at public gardens trumps the combined attendance at all professional sports including baseball, football, basketball, hockey, races and golf. It is not easy to meet the needs and expectations of all of our visitors or the green industry. I would like to share some of the inspiring themes that motivate me as we enter a next chapter in our gardens' history.

It is striking to reflect on how fortunate we are to have volunteers to maintain and curate a majority of the gardens and plantings within the park. Even younger botanical gardens that are much smaller in acreage, with fewer visitors than our gardens have exponentially larger staffs with clear roles. While we clearly have a



treasure in our volunteers, we are missing the consistency of a professional staff that would measure, record and understand our plant communities and the health of water, soils and wildlife in the gardens.

The western landscape of the Botanical Center is a poignant example where traditional horticultural practices employed to decorate with ornamental plants in a vacuum where the soil was not prepared and plants were never allowed to thrive, create an impactful eyesore as a guest's first impression.

I enjoyed listening to the Chicago Botanic Garden discuss their efforts in soil renovation and feeding the soil microbes to set plants up for success. I took solace in knowing that most gardens struggle to find sufficient desirable plant material and must grow their own in their on site nurseries and greenhouses. However, most of these gardens had basic infrastructure tools to overcome those challenges.

While you won't see the staff or facilities behind the scenes at the Springfield Botanical Gardens to monitor and manage pests and disease, or even to simply harvest a seed and help it grow; we have the volunteers to educate and empower all of our partners.

To summarize our basic goals, we should be stunning every day, a resource for educational purposes of all kinds and accepting and serving the most diverse audiences. This will take training from the ground up, and I hope to harness Springfield's wealth of knowledge from community experts. It is my goal in the coming year to provide more opportunities for people to volunteer in ways not seen before.
